## **Julia Perry**

Born 3/25/1924 in Lexington, KY Died 4/24/1979 at age 55 in Akron, OH

## A Short Piece for Orchestra

Written 1952, at age 28; revised 1955, 65 Premiered 1952 in Turin, Italy; Turin Symphony; Dean Dixon conductor

- Perry was a prolific composer of music for orchestra, chamber ensemble, chorus, and voice. She wrote over a dozen symphonies, as well as two concertos and three operas.

#### **Florence Price**

Born 4/9/1887 in Little Rock, AR Died 6/3/1953 at age 66 in Chicago

#### **Piano Concerto in One Movement**

#### LARA DOWNES piano

Written 1932–34, in Price's mid 40s Premiered 6/24/1934 at Orchestra Hall in Chicago; Chicago Musical College Orchestra; Price *piano* 

- Price was the first Black American woman to have a piece performed by a major symphony orchestra; the Chicago Symphony Orchestra played her Symphony No. 1 in 1933, followed by this piano concerto a year later.
  - In 2020, pianist Lara Downes released the album *Florence Price: Piano Discoveries*, featuring world-premiere recordings of newly discovered piano works by this groundbreaking composer.

## Sergei Rachmaninoff

Born 4/1/1873 in either Oneg or Semyonovo, Russia Died 3/28/1943 at age 69 in Beverly Hills, CA

## Symphony No. 3

- Lento–Allegro moderato–Allegro (slow, then moderately fast, then fast) *17 min*
- Adagio ma non troppo—Allegro vivace (slow but not too slow, then lively and fast) *12 min*
- Allegro–Allegro vivace–Allegro (fast, then lively and fast, then fast) 13 min
- Written 1935–36, in Rachmaninoff's early 60s; revised 1938
- Premiered 11/6/1936 in Philadelphia; Philadelphia Orchestra; Leopold Stokowski conductor
- Rachmaninoff hadn't written a symphony for nearly 30 years when he began composing this piece. Some speculate that the massive success of his second symphony made him wary of trying to write another.
- This symphony was written at the composer's custom-built villa on Switzerland's Lake Lucerne, where the Rachmaninoff's lived after fleeing Russia. WWII would soon cause another move, this time to the United States.
